## **Autumn -- Whole-hearted Beginnings**

We are arrived at Autumn. The September tomatoes have settled in the garden and its time to pull and toss them into the compost pile. It seems cruel. There is something in me that is not ready to let go of summer. The garden is one of them. We've carefully cultivated all these months. Tomatoes given by Charlie in Spring have done their best, full of heart they bloom again. There are still pale yellow flowers bobbing in the air with the hope there still might be time to fruit. In Southern California the issue isn't killing frost, it is October heat and Santana wind, burning the vines, withering the fruit. Either way, cold or heat, this garden is at its end.

Autumn is not an end. It is a beginning. In some climates it is time to begin to enjoy the abundant harvest. In those climates it is also time to plan the winter wheat that will sprout and lie under snow awaiting warmth to stretch upward. My garden in zone 9/10 has come to an end and is ready for reincarnation. It is a beginning: time now to prepare for winter plants: Beets, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Kale, Lettuce, Onion, and Spinach are in the nursery. It's Autumn, time to begin again, again.

Autumn at New Hope isn't a time to slow down or winter-over either. We have a month full of important activities for the church, for you and your family, and for the community.

October 4th – Sunday worship includes the blessing of our pets. This month commemorates the life of St. Francis who was known for his commitment to and living into the Christian life for creation and creatures. So tune in to our worship on Sunday to see a special location and blessing of your pets.

October 10th – Saturday. New Hope hosts the Lombard Mennonite Peace Center for a webinar (9:30-11:00 AM) entitled "The Use of Language: Agreeing and Disagreeing in Love." This class on Zoom will assist your life and family with tools for conflict management and resolution. See our website to sign up today!

October 11th – Sunday is the conclusion of our stewardship drive with the collection of pledges received at church 10:30 - noon. New Hope establishes its 2021 budget based in part by pledged support from members of the church. If you would like to pledge but have not received or misplaced your pledge card, you can receive one at church on October 11th or you can call the church for a card to be sent to you by mail.

October 11th also is the Drive-Thru Holy Communion Sunday (10:30 - noon). We are offering Holy Communion in the parking lot at the church building that day. Please return the post card in your stewardship letter to let us know you will be participating or if you'd still like Holy Communion

delivered to your home (as we have been doing since pandemic). We ask you to remain in your car and the Deacon and myself will bring Holy Communion to you in your vehicle.

The end of the month is the celebration of Reformation Day and we have special events planned for our worship that day. Stayed tuned.

I want to close with an encouragement to continue vigilance with social distancing, hand washing and hygiene, and wearing a mask. We care for the lives of every member of our church and community. We ask you to be smart, follow guidelines, and stay safe. We will be together sooner if we remain vigilant.

This time apart gives each of us a period to focus on prayer and devotion and study. This far into pandemic your discipline may be waning. We invite you to participate in one of our Zoom studies during the week. There is something for everyone. If you would like material to enhance your personal prayer time or your study of God's word, please ask. It is time to pray fervently for those working on treatment plans and vaccines to fight this virus. It is also time to pray, in these next five weeks, for the election of leadership of our nation that will take us into a united future as a global leader. We ask for God's guidance, wisdom, and intervention.

Like Autumn, this time of pandemic is not necessarily an end of activity. Instead, it can be like turning the soil for deeper roots, achieving greater harvest in the vitality of your spiritual life.

Finally, promise me that, if you are not allergic, you will get the flu vaccine soon. The Center for Disease Control tell us this flu season partnered with the Coronavirus is potentially more dangerous. I plan on getting the flu shot this weekend before the beginning of flu season. Annual influenza epidemics follow a winter seasonal pattern in the United States with typical activity peaking during late December to early February. The CDC recommends getting a flu vaccination in September or October so plan to get your vaccine soon.

Under the current guidelines, the Deacon and I are still not allowed to make pastoral care visits to the local hospitals and most nursing facilities (and there are significant restriction of family visits, as well). It is a strange time to be sick, to schedule a surgery, or to have a procedure at the hospital. Do yourself a favor and, as far as it is up to you, do the things that promote wellbeing and good health. Of course, if you need medical treatment, please seek it and don't delay it. Say in contact with us and with members of the church family – we want to provide quality care and will do our best to support you in time of need.

Let me close by thanking you and all those who attended our Annual Meeting on September 27th. We worried about having such a meeting in a virtual setting via Zoom. We had nearly 80 people (a quorum is 57) and good discussion of the agenda items. Thank you!

We are fatigued from pandemic, unrest, division of our times. Tod Bolsinger from Fuller Seminary writes: It's tempting to just want to give up, binge-watch another show, or pull the covers over our heads and hope it will be 2022 soon. But could there by another way?

"The antidote to exhaustion is not necessarily rest," Brother David Steindl-Rast told poet David Whyte.

"What is it then?", David Whyte asked.

"The antidote to exhaustion is whole-heartedness." (from an online article entitled "How not to Waste a Crisis")

Let us be whole-hearted in our community life. We are praying with and for you. May God guide our life together through this critical time. Thanks for being you, being New Hope.

### From the Youth Director, Pastor Scott

Matthew 21: 23-32

Last week Pastor Nikki and I decided to watch a movie that we had seen advertised on social media, the movie was about, well social media. It is called the Social Dilemma and it is a very, very deep dive into how social media applications like Facebook, Instagram, and Snapchat work. And I don't mean how to use different filters when taking selfies or how to record different types of videos and post them to your Instagram story, but essentially how these companies have figured out how to keep you engaged in your social media, even to the point of being addicted to it, all for a huge profit.

One of the most interesting things is how information is presented to us on our social media feeds. Now you might be thinking, well obviously the stuff I click on and the stuff I like determines what I will see more of, but it goes even deeper than that, these applications even time how long you look at a picture or how long you engage in a video, just by using it and looking at your screen they continue to get a better idea of what is going to keep you coming back to your phone. The other shocking thing is that the documentary talked about was that when you use Google to search for something when you type in your search and google autofills it, that autofill will be changed depending on your location. You will be shown something different if you live in California as opposed to Ohio or Texas.

When all of these factors combine, we all of a sudden have our own little worlds that show us the information that we want to see, it cultivates this reality where there are no competing viewpoints and for some reason we are surprised when someone mentions seeing a story or piece of information on Facebook and we are confused because we have never seen anything even resembling it. And imagine if you saw something on your feed that stood for something you completely disagreed with. When that happens it is almost surprising, like "what is this doing here" and this is a question we see in the Gospel of Matthew.

Jesus is teaching in the temple and the chief priests and the elders of the people come to see what he is doing and question by what authority he is doing such things. For them there is something wrong with the algorithm, this shouldn't be showing up on their feed. And things like this still happen today, if there is one thing I see on my video feed on Facebook is videos of people questioning the presence of others in certain spaces. Specifically white people questioning people of color what they are doing in their neighborhood or why are they picking up trash outside their building, when that person also lives in the building, why are you swimming in this pool in my apartment complex, who do you know that lives here? When in fact people of color do not need to constantly justify why they are occupying space like the rest of us do on a daily basis and are never questioned.

I would highly recommend watching the social dilemma and thinking long and hard about some of the social dilemmas that we are currently dealing with in our society. Amen.




