Giving Thanks Even in 2020

The Apostle Paul knew hardship and imprisonment. He suffered for the gospel he was proclaiming. Yet in the midst of it all, St. Paul knew that true freedom was found in Christ. So, he said, "Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus" (1 Thessalonians 5: 16-18 NIV). From one end of the Bible to the other, we are commanded to be thankful. In fact, thankfulness is the natural outflowing of a heart that is attuned to God. The psalmist declared, "Sing to the Lord with thanksgiving" (Psalm 147:7, NIV). Paul wrote, "Be thankful" (Colossians 3:15, NIV). A spirit of thanksgiving is always the mark of a joyous Christian. Ingratitude is seen as apart from God's will (in other words, a sin).

I know it is 2020 and we are having a hard time being grateful, but we have plenty of reason to give thanks... even in 2020! Why should we be thankful?

Thank God for the Material Blessings

We never seem to be satisfied with what we have - rich or poor, healthy or sick. But what a difference it makes when we realize that everything we have has been given to us by God! Old King David prayed, "Wealth and honor come from you ... We give you thanks, and praise your glorious name ... Everything comes from you" (1 Chronicles 29:12-14, NIV).

Wealth and poverty are not two sides of the gratitude spectrum. I have known miserable wealthy people who have an insatiable appetite and are never content. On the other hand, I've known people of very humble means who are radiant with joy. The difference is usually gratitude.

St. Paul declared, "I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want" (Philippians 4:12, NIV). A spirit of thankfulness makes all the difference.

Are you constantly preoccupied with what you do not have? Or have you learned to thank God for what you do have? Give thanks...it will do you good.

Thank God for the People in Your Life

It is so easy to take people for granted, or even to complain and become angry because they do not always meet our expectations. But we need to give thanks for those around us - our spouses, our children, our relatives, our friends, and others who help us in some way. We've all come through an elongated period of isolation - many have a renewed sense of the profound gift the presence of other people provides. Thank God for those who touch your life.

On November 1st we celebrate the Sunday of All Saints and, as is our tradition, held a remembrance for those who have died in the previous year. We rang a bell and spoke the names of over 40 people. We lifted up in prayer (love, honor, and grief) six New Hope Lutheran Church members in that group: Donald Pryor; Steve Blair; Ronald David; Arnold Reuter; Marian Pasko; and Denny Koons. Remember these dear friends and reach out to their loved ones to extend your love and care.

I'm also very thankful for you, dear New Hope family. We've had a hard year, each one. However, you have been faithful in your giving and good works. We are ahead on the 2020 budget and you will see posted in the newsletter the excellent financial commitments (in pledges) for 2021! I thank God for you!

Thank God in the Midst of Trials and Even Persecution

We draw back from difficulties, yet not one of us is exempt from trouble. During those trials we can thank God, because we know that God has promised to be with us and that God will help us. We know that God can use times of suffering to draw us spiritually closer: "My brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of any kind, consider it nothing but joy, because you know that the testing of your faith produces endurance; and let endurance have its full effect, so that you may be mature and complete, lacking in nothing." (James 1:2-3, NRSV).

I do not know what trials you may be facing right now, but God does, and God loves you and is with you by the Holy Spirit. Cultivate a spirit of thankfulness even amid trials and heartaches and see if your burden or how you carry it changes.

Thank God for His Continued Presence and Power in Your Life

When we come to Christ, it is not the end but the beginning of a whole new life! He is with us, and wants to help us follow God's Word and emulate the life of Jesus. In ourselves we do not have the strength that we need to live the way God wants us to live. But when we turn to God, we discover that "it is God who works in [us] to will and to act according to his good purpose" (Philippians 2: 13).

In our country a special day is set aside each year for thanksgiving. It will be a different kind of Thanksgiving this year. But for the Christian every day can be a day of thanksgiving, as we are "always giving thanks to God the Father for everything, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ" (Ephesians 5:20, NIV). Gratitude makes a huge difference in our life. May I ask you to work on this gratitude project this month? Can you think of one thing each day of November for which you are grateful? Keep the list and, some time during Thanksgiving, read it aloud again to yourself or to those gathered to celebrate! I think you and everyone gathered will be blessed by your outpouring of gratitude, even or especially in 2020!

Join us for worship online and join us for our next parking lot Holy Communion (most likely November 22... watch for details). I also want to invite you to the Interfaith Thanksgiving service online this year as well (we will make it available through our website). It will most certainly be a blessing to gather religious communities as one in a collaboration of gratitude!

We are a blessed people by a good God! Praise to Jesus, the King of kings!

From the Youth Director, Pastor Scott

Psalm 1

- ¹Blessed is the one
 who does not walk in step with the wicked
 or stand in the way that sinners take
 or sit in the company of mockers,
 ² but whose delight is in the law of the Lord,
 and who meditates on his law day and night.
- ³ That person is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither— whatever they do prospers.
- ⁴ Not so the wicked! They are like chaff that the wind blows away.
- ⁵ Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.
- ⁶ For the Lord watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked leads to destruction.

In scripture there are many references to both us, God, and Jesus as plants. Jesus talks about being the true vine and we are the branches. In Psalm 1 the writer talks about the person who delights in the law of the lord being like a tree that is planted near the water. This kind of tree flourishes and produces fruit and whose leaves do not wither. This also brings to light another theme that scripture often touches on and that is our foundation. About how ones house is built on either sand or rock. Where we begin, where we are rooted is clearly very important to the writers of the different books of the Bible.

But just as the writers of scripture like to talk about our foundation, our beginnings, our current society loves a good story about someone who is overcoming the odds, rags to riches as it's known. When we see these stories portrayed in books and movies, it comes off as an inspiration, someone who has nothing works so hard and finally all that work pays off and they now have a much better life because of it. On the surface this sounds like a great story and something to be inspired by, and to a certain extent I agree. But this also begs the question, why did that person have to start there? Why did they have so many obstacles to overcome in the first place?

When we look at the situations that some people are put in and really think about the phrase, against all odds, that should be troubling. Why are people in these dire situations needing what sounds like a miracle to make it out of said situation. One would think that there would be systems in place to help people either never get to this sort of scenario or at least give them a helping hand when they hit rock bottom. If you are someone who likes gardening and I said that I was only going to give some of my plants water, some of them just sunshine and the others everything they need to succeed that would sound crazy to you right? Why would any of those plants need to go without something that I clearly can provide for them?

Yet in the current world that we live in, there are so many people who find themselves without a home, without clean water to drink and sometimes with no food to eat. Yet in 2010 the U.S. wasted 133 billion, that's billion with a B, pounds of food were wasted and I would assume that this number has not changed by much even after a decade. That is enough food to feed every single person on the planet with ease. Yet we continue to let children go to school hungry making it much more difficult for them to concentrate and potentially do well in school, which could effect their chances at getting the education they deserve and would therefore effect many aspects of their adult life. All because the foundation for that child was a poor one that could be avoided.

We should be making sure that those around us resemble a tree that is planted by a flowing stream, that they have the opportunity to prosper in the ways that God has called them. If you are someone who was given a good foundation and opportunities that were granted by privilege, I hope that you reflect on that and have some gratitude for that, but then I hope you work to make sure that everyone has a chance to bear good fruit and have a solid foundation.

Thank you for your continued generosity in 2020! Your giving through September amounted to \$315,660, about 8% over budget. This does not include the PPP loan/grant amount. Our expenditures so far this year are about 5% below budget; although year-end funding of a long term repair fund is anticipated.




