Dear Friends in Christ,

A blessed First Sunday of Advent and a joyful new church year to each of you!

2021 will be a Year of Prayer emphasis for New Hope. It is my prayer for the new year that we grow strong in the practice of Daily Prayer. Jesus is the cornerstone of our faith; Prayer and Scripture are the foundation stones for a life of discipleship.

2021 will be devoted to prayer. Of course, 2022 will be devoted to Scripture.

Our Year of Prayer memory verse will be Philippians 4:6 "Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." When we are together in Zoom or (eventually) in person, I would love to hear you recite this beautiful verse!

Advent is a season marked by waiting in expectation, hoping for the promise to come, serving out of the love we receive from God, and living at peace with ourselves and others (Advent candles represent hope, peace, joy and love). We will light a candle each Sunday and pray for and work at making God's hope, peace, joy, love to be manifest, made real and tangible, among us. You have been given a weekly Advent Devotional book as a reminder to keep a holy Advent season. We have framed the season of Advent with the theme: "Let There Be..."

As we prepare to deepen our prayer life, lead the Year of Prayer in families or shape the life of our church family, I will commend to you a couple initial opportunities for growth and conversation.

How to Pray: A Simple Guide for Normal People by Pete Greig (currently \$13.50 paperback at Amazon... remember to use Amazon Smile for a donation!) How to Pray easily divides into 5 sections that I would like to discuss once per month (5:30 PM) like this:

Wednesday, December 30 – How to Pray (Introduction, chapter 1 & 2 or intro and pages 1-31)

Wednesday, January 27 – Step 1: Pause (pages 34-49)

Wednesday, February 24 – Step 2: Rejoice (pages 50-69)

Wednesday, March 31 – Step 3: Ask (pages 72-129) (if back in person, this date will shift due to Holy Week)

Wednesday, April 28 – Step 4: Yield (pages 131-222)

Secondly, Prayer Ventures - These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social, and outreach ministries of our whole church, the ELCA, as well as for the needs and circumstances of our neighbors, communities, and world. There is no better way to learn to pray than to engage in prayer itself. This monthly guide will keep you praying each day of the year. See attached document: Prayer Ventures December 2020.

As we close a year unlike any other we have experienced, ever, I encourage you to do the inner work that leads to outward fruitfulness. This year we choose to unwrap and experience the gift of conversation with God (what we call prayer). Prayer, among other gifts, helps us engage in the humble task of truly learning how to live with God. Prayer helps by developing skills for a real and consistent relationship with God. Paul Marshall (Barefoot Revolution, Paraclete Press 2018) wrote The Christian response to the onslaught of secular ideologies and science-based "new atheism" isn't just a dogfight over philosophies, but to cultivate a vital spiritual life that generates authentic power and radical love. Maybe you have not been able to go to the gym for a while, but I invite you into a discipline that is as difficult and even more fruitful: spiritual discipline. Join us in the various activities planned for The Year of Prayer.

I also encourage you to join us for worship online and encourage your leaders. We've all had an unusual and difficult year and many are left unsure where they stand in relationship to their community, their friends, and community organizations. Let us know you are out there engaging by posting a note to our You Tube post or on our website or Facebook page.

Finally, get engaged in our life together. For the size of our church, we offer a surprising array of experiences, studies, and discussions:

PRAYER VENTURES DECEMBER 2020

These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the ELCA, as well as for the needs and circumstances of our neighbors, communities and world. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

- 1 World AIDS Day Pray for compassion, understanding and healing for individuals, families and communities worldwide that are living with or affected by HIV and AIDS. Give thanks for the dedicated service and skill of doctors, pastors, public officials, health care educators, care providers and researchers who treat the infected, bring hope to the discouraged and weary, and respond to the disease's spiritual, physical, emotional and social impacts.
- 2 -The Spirit is at work in times of anticipation and yearning, reminding us of God's promises and activity, helping us stay calm and patient, and redirecting our attention from ourselves to our neighbors in need nearby and around the world.
- 3 Give thanks for the new ELCA social message "Government and Civic Engagement in the United States: Discipleship in a Democracy." Pray that it will help us understand how government is a gift from God but can also be abused and misused. Ask the Spirit to guide us as we prayerfully reflect on how we can view civic engagement as Lutherans.
- 4 What do you anticipate and watch for during this season of Advent? Pray for what you yearn and hope for, and give thanks that God is faithful to God's promises, especially through the gift of life to the world through Jesus Christ.
- 5 As we are immersed in the joy, festivities and busyness of Advent and Christmas, pause to pray for our global neighbors who have suffered through devastating natural disasters and need our support, generosity and assistance. Pray particularly for the many nations that have experienced drought and for those impacted by the earthquake in Turkey and Greece, Typhoon Goni hitting the Philippines and multiple hurricanes impacting Mexico, the Caribbean region and the United States.
- 6 Pray that the Spirit will give us a measure of John the Baptist's boldness, commitment, humility and resolve as we share the good news of Jesus Christ and the promise of God's love and mercy with everyone we encounter or approach throughout our baptismal journey.
- 7 Give thanks for caregivers, staff and nurses in senior communities, nursing homes, rehabilitation hospitals, and memory-care and assisted-living facilities. Ask God to grant them strength, wisdom, skill and a spirit of hope and joy as they go about their difficult and often tiring work.
- 8 Pray for patience, caution and concern for our neighbor during the continuing COVID-19 pandemic; pray that the Spirit and our siblings in Christ will help us cope with and adjust to the implications of the pandemic for this season in which we are accustomed to gathering in person for meals, celebrations, worship, family gatherings and community events.
- 9 Pray that God will help us lead lives of holiness, godliness, peace and active engagement with the world as disciples of Christ who wait patiently for the day of the Lord.
- 10 This has been, and continues to be, a very difficult year of coping with and recovering from natural disasters across our country and around the world. Pray that the presence and hope of God will be evident where there is despair, grief and uncertainty over how to begin rebuilding and healing. Pray that neighbors, communities and nations will work together to provide assistance, resources and relief workers where the needs are most critical.
- 11 Ask for God's forgiveness and take to heart God's word of love, peace, healing and guidance that restores our faith and spirit as children of God.
- 12 Give thanks for the church traditions that remind us of God's actions throughout history and inspire our faith, generosity and commitment to serve our neighbors in need. Pray that we will carry these meaningful traditions forward and create new rites and traditions that inspire and strengthen all generations in today's changing contexts.
- 13 Pray that we might passionately witness to the light of Jesus Christ and boldly invite others to believe and to be baptized into the body of Christ and the community of all believers.
- 14 ELCA Good Gifts provide an opportunity for you to support the ministries and programs domestic and global that mean the most to you and the people you love. Give thanks that our church believes God is calling us into the world together and that, through our generosity and love, we can make a difference.
- 15 What do our gifts mean, and what impact do they have? Pray for thoughtfulness when we buy gifts, for awareness of who we include and exclude, and for mindfulness of how the money we spend during this time of thanksgiving might fulfill God's loving, merciful and generous promises.

- 16 Los Posadas This traditional celebration, popular in Mexico and observed by some ELCA congregations, uses lighted paths and processions to follow Mary and Joseph's journey through Bethlehem in search of lodging. Pray that our recollection of Mary and Joseph's experience might prompt us to welcome strangers, immigrants and neighbors in need.
- 17 "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." Pray that we will support and encourage each other in these good works and disciplines that keep our spirits, minds and bodies healthy and whole.
- 18 Pray that, in anticipation of Christmas, we will invite others into the joy of our meals, celebrations, community events and faith. Pray that the Spirit will move us to reach out with acts of love, hope, inclusion and good news to people who are alone, incarcerated or homeless.
- 19 "The Lord has done great things for us." Rejoice, laugh and shout with joy!
- 20 Pray that we will be receptive to angels and divine beings sent by God to guide us and bring us good news, as the angel Gabriel did to Mary and Elizabeth. Pray that we will hear God's assurance that "nothing will be impossible with God" and that our response will echo Mary's: "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word."
- 21 Winter solstice On this day with the least amount of daylight, observed as the beginning of winter, pray that we will be drawn to the eternal light of Christ born into the world a gift for all people and all generations that illuminates God's redemptive love for us and God's desire and intent for how we might live together.
- 22 Remember in prayer the approximately 26 million refugees, immigrants and asylum-seekers around the world and at our borders, awaiting entry into safe, welcoming countries and communities so that they can rebuild their lives without threats of conflict, persecution, violence or economic crisis. Pray for their safety, that their spiritual, physical and emotional needs will be met, that they will find caring advocates, and that their faith and hope will be strengthened and sustained by siblings in Christ and our faith communities.
- 23 With prayerful sighs of relief and expressions of gratitude, give thanks for God's covenant to grant humankind love, forgiveness, new life and redemption through the promised Messiah, Jesus Christ.
- 24 Remember and give thanks for the people in your life who taught you the nativity story and recounted the promise God made to us and fulfilled through Jesus Christ.
- 25 Christmas Day Give praise and thanks for God's boundless love, mercy and grace, revealed to the world and all humanity through the light of Jesus Christ son of God, son of humanity; our source of truth, salvation, new life and wholeness.
- 26 Beginning of Kwanzaa Kwanzaa is a weeklong celebration of African culture and traditions that stresses family, community and shared principles. Give thanks for the rich and meaningful traditions, celebrations and practices of our African American siblings and the global African community.
- 27 Pray for the Spirit to help us understand and have faith in Jesus as the son of God, born to walk among us, live through our daily struggles and needs, teach us God's ways and word, and restore our relationships with God, one another and creation.
- 28 Pray that we will carry forward the story and significance of Jesus and their implications for our daily actions, relationships and decisions as loved and reclaimed children of God. Ask the Spirit to guide us in responding to God's call to proclaim the gospel, make peace, work for justice, propagate hope and serve our neighbors in need without partiality, foot-dragging, embarrassment or expectation of reward or credit.
- 29 Let our prayers, creation and all living things give glory and honor to God, our creator, sustainer, guiding light and redeemer.
- 30 Pray that the light, celebration and blessings of community we experience as followers of Christ will continue far beyond the Christmas holidays and permeate our daily lives as we participate in God's life-giving work and witness in the world.
- 31 New Year's Eve A new year can offer hope and enthusiasm for starting anew, or it can bring fear and despair stirred by our human weaknesses and failures. Ask God to help us achieve our new endeavors and resolutions and reground ourselves in God's grace, forgiveness and newness when we fall short of our expectations and goals. Ask the Spirit to help us encourage, assist and surround with grace people who stumble or whose confidence is unsteady.

How was your Thanksgiving? Ours was very quiet. We stayed home, stayed inside, and cooked for two. The closest we got to our family was a couple of Zoom sessions, one while all three households were cooking, and one after dinner but before pie. And honestly? It wasn't a lot of fun. I was reminded, for the second time in forty-two years of marriage that cooking turkey and dressing for two makes just as much mess in the kitchen as if you were doing it for seven, or even twenty-seven. The only thing that there were less of were dinner plates, and those go in the dishwasher.

There was one more thing, actually, that there was less of; there was less chance of illness, and sharing illness. This year might not have been fun, but it was probably wise. I'm still trying to track down who said the phrase I've been using most: "A Zoom Thanksgiving is better than an ICU Christmas." It seems to have been said first among doctors who are working in our nation's hospitals, who see up close how COVID-19 ravages the human body.

If we all keep working for good, in loving ways that keep ourselves and others safe, this Thanksgiving will be one of a kind. By next year this time we should be back at work, back at school, and back to gathering together as families and as a congregation. That's the kind of hope I hold onto.

As I write this, we are coming up on the first Sunday of Advent, the Sunday of hope. May we keep all four of the Advent candles lit this season: hope, joy, love, and peace. And may we do all we can to make this year one of a kind.



From the Youth Director, Pastor Scott

1 Peter 2:4-10

⁴As you come to him, the living Stone - rejected by humans but chosen by God and precious to him — ⁵you also, like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house ^[a] to be a holy priesthood, offering spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. ⁶ For in Scripture it says:

"See, I lay a stone in Zion,

a chosen and precious cornerstone,

and the one who trusts in him

will never be put to shame."[b]

⁷ Now to you who believe, this stone is precious. But to those who do not believe,

"The stone the builders rejected

has become the cornerstone,"[c]

⁸ and,

"A stone that causes people to stumble and a rock that makes them fall."

They stumble because they disobey the message - which is also what they were destined for.
⁹But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light. ¹⁰Once you were not a people, but now you are the people of God; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.

In our Gospel reading this past Sunday, Jesus talked about the cornerstone and this message clearly stuck with the writer of 1Peter and is the driving force of our passage for this week's devotional. There are two parts to this that I want to focus on for this week and the first is the part of the passage that says "you are the chosen people." This idea of being chosen is one that we crave even from a young age. How often do we hear the hypothetical or for some people actual story of being picked last for the team in elementary school. Being chosen last is not something anyone ever wants to happen and that's because in our mind we actually don't feel chosen in that moment.

In that moment we feel that we are only "chosen" because there is nobody else to choose from, that surely if there was someone else they would be chosen over us. There is something about us that desires to be chosen to feel like someone sees something in us, maybe they see potential or purpose. Sometimes it can be painfully clear when someone feels like they have a purpose compared to someone who maybe feels lost and unsure about theirs. Even the writer of 1Peter puts it in a way that I think speaks to how we really feel when we feel chosen, "God's special possession." We feel special when we have purpose, when we feel like we are doing "what we were born to do"

This sounds great, but I think that this is where we can start to go to a place that is problematic. I think that we often confuse being chosen and being special. Even though there isn't anyone else exactly like us in the world, we still share so many things in common that as humans there are many things that we have in common as well. But for some reason when we think about ourselves that way we think less of ourselves, because we are not as unique as we thought, we want to stand out, we want to be individuals. Now I do think that there is value to knowing ones self and being true to who you are, but we must also remember that just as we are chosen as the writer of 1Peter says, "a holy people" it doesn't say a holy individual and I think that really says something. We are called together and then I think within that community that is where we find our individualism, but the importance of community cannot be understated.

Well whatever way you want to look at it I hope that you know that you are chosen by God. God has given you gifts to use in this life and we are all on the journey to figure out what those gifts are and how we are called to use those gifts. And not only how can we use those gifts, but how we can use them in the communities that we are a part of? And what are some things that we share in common with those whom we are in community with? I think the most important thing that we all share and have the capacity for is to show and share love. We will all do this in different ways, but it is something we all can do. When we share this love that God has shown to us we, declare the praises of the God who calls us into a beautiful light. So if you take only one thing away from this, know that you have the capacity and ability to share love and even though everyone can do this, it is still truly special.

Thank you for your continued generosity in 2020! Your giving through October amounted to \$346,772, about 6% over budget. This does not include the PPP loan/grant amount. Our expenditures so far this year are about \$17,000 below budget. The new mortgage

at the lower monthly premium took effect in October.




