LENT

Three days after Valentine's Day this year is Ash Wednesday, February 17th, the beginning of the Season of Lent. Valentine's Day is about human love. Lent is a season of repentance. The convergence of these days makes for profound themes: love and repentance.

Love

The good news of the gospel is this: God loves you because God loves. God's love is underserved and extends to unworthy and broken folks of all kinds for all times. God loves the ungodly, the degenerate, and the unwilling – like Paul, who considered himself the worst of sinners (1 Timothy 1: 15).

Repentance

God's love has a purpose. God loves to claim the wayward and change their lives. God brings them into a close relationship, transforming and altering their lives. God does all of this in advance. We do not change to earn acceptance from God. "While we were sinners Christ died for us" (Romans 5). Such amazing divine grace prompts us to respond, to follow God's path, not our own. We are changed to love God and neighbor – the two great commandments that summarize God's commands (Matthew 22: 37-40) not to fulfil an obligation but because it leads to abundant life. A new life appears and, as new creatures, we abandon our old sinful ways for the life that is better, sweeter than our brokenness and sin. In the same way, human love changes the one who loves and the beloved.

When things are not in our lives or relationship with God or others; God does not excuse us of our sin and broken relationships. God is not fooled by our attempts to self-justify and earn our forgiveness. Forgiving the grave sin of humanity came at the ultimate cost to God. To understand this truth is to know that "Repent, for the Kingdom of God is near" (Jesus opening message in Mark 1:15) is both a call to repentance and a statement of love.

God does not want us to continue a path of self-destruction and, so, even God's warning to repent is an invitation made with love and desire to be united with us.

Important themes: Love and Repentance. Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday.

Again this year we are joining together with our partner churches to celebrate Ash Wednesday and our Lenten pilgrimage to a deeper relationship with God. We will be releasing our worship for you to view at home, as we have been doing with our Sunday worship.

Lent mid-week. You will learn more about mid-week plans in this edition of the New Hope Newsletter. We hope you join us for these activities.

Along with those events, I would like to invite you to add to your Lenten disciplines the following prayers for your church's renewal. The traditional Lenten disciplines include, among others: fasting, service, learning, and prayer. Since 2021 is our Year of Prayer, I want to invite you to begin to pray for the renewal of New Hope asking God to mold us into the church essential for ALL of our members and for our changing community.

40 Days of Prayer Leading to Renewal

Day 1 (Ash Wednesday, February 17th)

Matthew 5:6

"Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled."

Remember to use the Prayer Ventures to also guide your daily prayer, along with prayers for the renewal of your spiritual life and that of your church. Here is the Prayer Venture for February 17th -

Ash Wednesday: Someone tracing the sign of the cross on our forehead with ash speaks to our need for physical reassurance that God has done something special and mysterious in the world through the life, suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Speak to God about what this smudge of ash - the cross - means to you and says to people who notice it on your forehead.

Ask God to create a hunger and thirst in your community for the grace of God. Then ask God to fill that hunger by renewed ministry through your church and the churches of your community. Pray that in this emphasis on prayer many will encounter God's transforming presence.

Day 2 (February 18th)

Acts 1:8

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

Pray for those who leading renewal in your congregation, and for those who hope for renewal to come - that the power of the Holy Spirit will lead them to be faithful witnesses to the gospel.

Day 3 (February 19th)

Psalm 103:1-5

"Bless the Lord, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and do not forget all his benefits - who forgives all your iniquity, who heals all your diseases, who redeems your life from the Pit, who crowns you with steadfast love and mercy, who satisfies you with good as long as you live so that your youth is renewed like the eagle's."

Praise God for all the benefits poured out on the human race through Jesus Christ. Pray that the outstretched arm of God may bring the benefits of forgiveness, wholeness, and renewal to many in your community.

Day 4 (February 20th)

Matthew 7:7

"Ask and it will be given you; search and you will find; knock, and the door will be opened for you."

Ask the Lord to guide all those who have a leadership role in your church and the churches of our community, that God's will may be done, that God may be glorified in everything that happens.

Day 5 (February 21st)

Ephesians 4:11-12

"The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ...,"

The renewal of the congregation will involve people, both leaders and participants, with varied kinds of giftedness. Ask the Lord to release the gifts of God in a mighty way to serve the gracious purposes of God.

Day 6 (February 22nd)

John 8:31-32

"Then Jesus said to [those] who had believed in him, 'If you continue in my word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know the truth, and the truth will make you free."

Pray that the word of God will bring people to know the truth and be set free from unbelief, wrong belief, of unclean powers that bind them. Pray that you will be open to God showing you greater truth, deeper love, and more active compassion. Ask God to help you yield to God's will when God is stretching you beyond your comfort zone.

Day 7 (February 23rd)

Isaiah 40:31

"but those who wait for the Lord shall renew their strength, they shall mount up with wings like eagles, they shall run and not be weary, they shall walk and not faint."

Spend some time meditating on this passage, thinking about its application for participation in your church. Yield to the prompting of the Spirit to encourage your congregation, it's leadership, and yourself in patient trust in the Lord to bring renewed spiritual vigor to your life and congregation.

Day 8 (February 24th)

Psalm 145

"I will extol you, my God and King, and bless your name for ever and ever. Every day I will bless you, and praise your name for ever and ever. Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; his greatness is unsearchable. One generation shall laud your works to another, and shall declare your mighty acts. On the glorious splendor of your majesty, and on your wondrous works, I will meditate. The might of your awesome deeds shall be proclaimed, and I will declare your greatness. They shall celebrate the fame of your abundant goodness, and shall sing aloud of your righteousness. The Lord is gracious and merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love. The Lord is good to all, and his compassion is over all that he has made. All your works shall give thanks to you, O Lord, and all your faithful shall bless you. They shall speak of the glory of your kingdom, and tell of your power, to make known to all people your mighty deeds, and the glorious splendor of your kingdom. Your kingdom is an everlasting kingdom, and your dominion endures throughout all generations. The Lord is faithful in all his words, and gracious in all his deeds. The Lord upholds all who are falling, and raises up all who are bowed down. The eyes of all look to you, and you give them their food in due season. You open your hand, satisfying the desire of every living thing. The Lord is just in all his ways, and kind in all his doings. The Lord is near to all who call on him. to all who call on him in truth. He fulfills the desire of all who fear him; he also hears their cry and saves them. The Lord watches over all who love him, but all the wicked he will destroy. My mouth will speak the praise of the Lord, and all flesh will bless his holy name for ever and ever."

Praise God for all the faithful works of the Lord throughout history to save and renew people. Remember those who were critical in your coming to faith and who guided you to deeper trust in Christ. Ask the Lord to do the same saving, renewing work in your life, in your church, in your acts of service for another generation of faithful children of God.

Day 9 (February 25th)

Romans 12:1-3

"I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of

your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God-what is good and acceptable and perfect."

Commend yourself to the Lord, seeking God's renewing power in your life. Pray for the same renewing power for everyone God calls to come to New Hope, to watch our worship video, or attend classes. Ask God to give your church leaders eyes to see the needs and wise discerning of the spiritual path for these newcomers, along with the courage to guide them into God's truth and encounter with the Holy Spirit. Pray God increases our adult baptisms and renewals of faith.

Day 10 (February 26th)

Matthew 19:14

"but Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of heaven belongs."

Pray for the children who will be impacted by your church, either directly or indirectly. Ask the Lord to shower the Holy Spirit upon all who attend confirmation or youth events, and for the parents of our church who are the first evangelists and spiritual guides to the way of Christ's for their children - that these might come to God with trust as a child trusts his/her parents.

Day 11 (February 27th)

Isaiah 43:1-2

"But now thus says the Lord, he who created you, O Jacob, he who formed you, O Israel: Do not fear, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine."

Pray that the Holy Spirit calls and gathers many people to your church, especially those who do not know God, that they may hear the Lord call their name. Pray for open pathways between the gospel and the 12 Step communities. Pray God saves lives through the work of the 12 Step groups that partner with us.

Day 12 (February 28th)

Ephesians 1:17-19

"I pray that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and revelation as you come to know him, so that, with the eyes of your heart enlightened, you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance among the saints, and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power for us who believe, according to the working of his great power."

Pray that people in your community and neighborhood will have the eyes of their heart opened by God, spoken to by God in dreams, visions, and circumstances of their lives. And that heeding God's call they will be enlightened by the ministry of your church and come to a meaningful relationship with Jesus as their Savior and Lover of their souls.

Day 13 (March 1st)

John 3:16-17

"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life. Indeed, God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him."

(From Prayer Ventures) We cannot fully comprehend God's ways or what Jesus has accomplished for our sake and salvation. Pray daily to be alert and receptive to what God is revealing to us and to how the Spirit stirs in us faith, wisdom and understanding.

Praise God for Jesus Christ, the fulfillment of God's love. Pray that many at the Bible studies, book studies, and small groups will come to know the power of forgiveness and the hope of Christ's resurrection.

PRAYER VENTURES FEBRUARY 2021

These petitions are offered as guides to prayer for the global, social and outreach ministries of the ELCA, as well as for the needs and circumstances of our neighbors, communities and world. Thank you for your continued prayers for the life and mission of this church.

1- Pray that the Spirit will guide, inspire and shape the Future Church structure being implemented in the churchwide organization to renew our sense of purpose and activate the entire church so that more people may know the way of Jesus and discover community, justice and love.

2 - *Black History Month* Give thanks for the gifts, accomplishments, influence and witness of our African-descent neighbors who stand together with us as partners in the gospel, doing God's work in the world. Though unified as siblings in Christ, we ask God to guide and help our church in its commitment to socioeconomic equity and racial justice and reconciliation.

3 - Give thanks for our freedom in Jesus Christ and pray that we might use that freedom to proclaim the glory of God and serve our neighbor in obedience to God's word, will and ways.

4 - Pray for the children, youth and family ministry leaders of our church participating in the ELCA Youth Ministry Network Extravaganza, "Holding Loosely." Pray that they will grow and be strengthened for ministry through this time of spiritual renewal, continuing education, networking and mutual support.

5 - Pray for ELCA Global Mission and for our ministry of accompaniment with churches, leaders, institutions and companion agencies in Asia and the Pacific region as we work together to grow the church, share the gospel, equip leaders, serve the needs of communities, address issues of development and justice, and assist with disaster preparedness and relief.

6 - Ask God to help us listen to each other with respect and to address and heal the political and ideological divisions that discourage us from treating one another with love and concern as neighbors and siblings in Christ. Pray that the Spirit will unite us and lead us in the work we must do together for the well-being of our communities, nation and neighbors in need.

7 - Illness, oppression, desperation and spiritual darkness are no match for the healing and redemptive power of Jesus Christ, the Son of God and our Savior. Praise God!

8 - Pray for all those who experience food insecurity across our nation and around the world. Ask God to help us envision how we can work together to bring relief and hope and to address the root causes of hunger and poverty.

9 - Give thanks to God for people of all ages, cultures, races, life experiences and perspectives who are new to the ELCA. Pray that, as siblings in Christ, we will nurture and equip one another for participating in God's work in the world.

10 - Give thanks and praise to God for God's abundant love, which "heals the brokenhearted, and binds up their wounds."

11 - Pray for our outdoor ministry organizations and their leaders as they continue to discern and plan for adapting their ministries during the pandemic especially as they envision what this summer might bring.

12 - Thank God for our special relationship with The Episcopal Church, a full communion partner with the ELCA since 1999. Pray for the church, its members and its leaders, and pray that together we will find strength and new resources for the work of sharing the gospel and serving our neighbor, especially in these uncertain and challenging times.

13 - When have you felt proud, boastful or self-congratulatory for your ministry, witness or service to others? Ask God to forgive you and to refocus your attention on the good news and blessings of grace given to us through Jesus Christ, which we are called to share without bias, hesitation or expectation of recognition or reward.

14 - We are not much different from Peter, James or John, who were unsure what they were witnessing when God's glory shined brightly in Jesus during his transfiguration. Pray for patience and for faith in God's promise, that we, too, will someday experience glory and joy in the kingdom of heaven.

15 - Pray for our new U.S. president, vice president and members of Congress, that they will find strength, support and unity for their difficult work of serving a diverse nation. Ask the Spirit to help us guide, shape and embolden our culture and nation so that we practice justice, care for our neighbors in need, strive for truth and support our global neighbors.

16 - Pray that when people witness our actions and hear our words, they will see the light of the gospel and the love of Jesus Christ in us and will be moved to believe in God's love, forgiveness and actions in the world today.

17- Ash Wednesday Someone tracing the sign of the cross on our forehead with ash speaks to our need for physical reassurance that God has done something special and mysterious in the world through the life, suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Speak to God about what this smudge of ash - the cross - means to you and says to people who notice it on your forehead.

18 - Ask the Spirit to teach us humility and to remind us that God made us to care for one another, love one another, be generous with what we have and participate in God's good, reconciling work in the world.

19 - Pray for families, caregivers and friends who cannot be physically present with hospitalized loved ones. Pray that we will support and comfort them through their time of separation and worry and reassure them of God's very real presence and love.

20 - God knows our complexities, vulnerabilities and shortcomings yet still considers us with the wisdom of a fair and merciful judge. With a deep sigh of relief, lift up thanks and praise to God!

21 - Renewed, claimed and sent forth through the word and the waters of baptism, we pray that our life in the Spirit will help us resist temptations that draw us away from God and God's ways and will keep us focused on our baptismal journey of faith, learning, service and sharing the good news.

22 - Give thanks for everyone involved in the extensive effort to vaccinate people against COVID- 19 even as we work to prevent its spread and treat those who are ill. Pray that the hope and the emotional, spiritual and physical stamina of these workers will be sustained for the long haul.

23 - Let our prayers and yearnings echo those of the psalmist who wrote, "Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. Lead me in your truth, and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation."

24 - Pray that throughout Lent we will reflect on our faith, lives and endeavors with honesty and humility while trusting in God's grace to restore our spirit and to reassure us that we will always be disciples of Christ and loved children of God.

25 - Remember in prayer the Deaconess Community of the ELCA. Give thanks and pray for women who respond to God's call to serve as deaconesses and who use their passions, spiritual gifts and education to serve in a wide variety of roles and ministry settings worldwide.

26 - Praise God for being patient and loving toward us and for saving us in our desperation and darkness through the suffering, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ.

27 - Pray for the ELCA Young Adult Ministry's work with young adults

ages 18 to 30 and for leaders who facilitate young adult ministry in their communities of faith. Pray that young adults will find places in our communities of faith where they belong and ministries both at home and abroad where they can grow in faith, discern and use their unique gifts and passions, and engage in acts of service, justice and peace in the world.

28 - We cannot fully comprehend God's ways or what Jesus has accomplished for our sake and salvation. Pray daily to be alert and receptive to what God is revealing to us and to how the Spirit stirs in us faith, wisdom and understanding.


From the Deacon

Romans 4:1-8

Abraham Justified by Faith

4 What then shall we say that Abraham, our forefather according to the flesh, discovered in this matter? 2 If, in fact, Abraham was justified by works, he had something to boast about - but not before God. 3 What does Scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was credited to him as righteousness."

4 Now to the one who works, wages are not credited as a gift but as an obligation. 5 However, to the one who does not work but trusts God who justifies the ungodly, their faith is credited as righteousness. 6 David says the same thing when he speaks of the blessedness of the one to whom God credits righteousness apart from works:

7 "Blessed are those

whose transgressions are forgiven, whose sins are covered.

8 Blessed is the one

whose sin the Lord will never count against them."

When deciding whether one is righteous or not how would you go about determining that? Straight away Paul asks this about Abraham and explains that for Abraham it was the fact that he believed in God. But surely there are righteous people who do not believe in God, that is not really what makes a righteous person. As Lutherans, this is traditionally a difficult question because we do not believe in works righteousness. We do not believe that there is anything that we can do or say that will save us, make a righteous. Instead, we count ourselves as blessed for having our sins forgiven through the saving act of Jesus.

So if we are forgiven then what is the point of doing good? What is the point of doing the right thing then, if ultimately, we cannot do anything to change the way that God feels about us? I think the first thing that needs to be clarified is that even though our actions may not change anything about God's love for us, it still has consequences in the other areas of our life. Therefore, we are not to take advantage of God's grace because even though we are forgiven that does not mean that there are no consequences. If someone runs a red light and gets into a car accident, the other people in the accident may eventually forgive that person, but that does not mean that the accident and everything that came from that no longer happened or exists.

One of the unfortunate realities that we currently live in is that the consequences of people's actions have a lot to do with the person who committed them. The actions that took place at the nation's capitol this past week are a clear indicator of that. This act of terror was not met with the same backlash by law enforcement as peaceful protests done by black and indigenous people of color.

Those protests were met with violence and resistance, yet people in the nation's capital seemed to be able to roam the halls without a care in the world and without fear. This is wrong and the consequences for doing such a thing should be carried out as such.

As people of faith it is our call to practice the act of forgiveness. We have come to understand that it is paramount when it comes to living together as humans. But again the consequences that come with that will still happen and are very real. Often we see these things as one or the other, but that's just not the case. And not only are we called to this forgiveness, but also we must make sure that justice is carried out so that the consequences are the same for all people, regardless of social or economic status, gender, sexuality, or race.

The fact that God loves us no matter what should be the driving force for us as people of faith to make sure the gift that we have been given is shown to all the people that we encounter. And in this day and age the definition of encounter means that the people whom we must stand for and with is more vast than ever before. We are so connected with the rest of the world that the amount of injustices that we are aware of every day is sometimes too much to keep up with. But this isn't because all of a sudden there are more of them, they are just more visible now then they ever have been and the fact that there are so many is not an excuse. We let it get to this place by being silent and complicit and that needs to end.

So as you pray for justice for those who have been wronged, as you pray for comfort and healing for those who are the victims of these injustices, may these be calls to action, that we would speak truth to the powerful and say that we aren't putting up with this any longer, no matter what the sacrifice is, because we know the power that true sacrifice can have in the example of Christ and may we go and do likewise. Amen.




