Upside Down and Unexpected



Being upside down in the world isn't anything new for the Christian. The Christian church often finds itself at odds with culture. You may feel this way as a Christian in our culture today. We are in good company with well-known saint central to the month of February. This month we celebrate Valentine's Day.

Valentine was a Roman Christian (or maybe a variety of Roman Christians) who were committed to the way and values of Christ. In one legend Valentine refused to worship the public leader, the emperor. In another legend, Valentine broke the law of the empire by marrying Christian couples to spare the husbands from being sent to war. These acts of matrimony and political resistance and civil disobedience by Valentine were illegal and, according to government officials, punishable by beheading. Valentine is a martyr.

Not a very sentimental message, I know. I don't mean to diminish your Valentine's Day with such a serious story. However, the reality behind the real Valentine challenges the sentimental meaning at the heart of how our society celebrates his commemoration. Valentine is upside down to his culture and ours. St. Valentine invites us to look deeper at real love. Real love isn't self-serving. Real love usually has a cost because it seeks what is in the best interest of the other. To seek the best interest of the other often means we must set aside our own desire for their betterment. It shouldn't need to be said, but it does need clarifying in our fallen world of exploitation and co-dependency: such love does not mean that in personal relationships only one person gets what they want. For love to work, each needs to seek the betterment of the other. Ephesians will say, "out of reverence for Christ there ought to be mutual servanthood." In society, Christians continue to live with loving action toward others and realize that there are times when such love and service moves in only one direction, like the grace Christ offers us on the cross).

Sunday we read Paul who wrote, "I know nothing but Christ and him crucified." In the world of religious beliefs and politics of the first century and the 21st this a perplexing statement. We read this along with the Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5. Following Christ brings a unique set of values that are often upside down from the culture. From the crucified we draw values like (among others):

Forgiveness Dignity & Inclusion Reconciliation Courage Compassion Care for the oppressed

Justice Non-violence With Valentine's Day just around the corner, we find ourselves looking for ways to show others that we love them. But how do we show God that we love God?

Jesus asked Peter three times "Do you love me?" Three times Peter responded, "Yes Lord, you know I love you." To each of his responses Jesus replied, "Feed my sheep." Jesus was showing Peter that an outpour of our love for Jesus is by caring for his children.

In Matthew 20:28 Jesus said of himself that "the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life for many." One of the simplest expressions of Love in Scripture is sharing with others. One of the most valuable things we can share is ourselves: our talents and energies in serving others.

Take an opportunity today to serve.

Do something truly unexpected (especially in our culture at this time) and extend unconditional, not expecting something in return, grace. Take the initiative and do more than what is expected. Be a person who keeps their word. Be a person who has disciplined speech and action so that love is heard and seen. Be a good spouse who seeks to out-serve their beloved. Return kindness for impatience. You know, the random act of kindness person. Protect the innocent and defend the cause of the needy. Take a risk for love's sake. Christ wants to know: Won't you be a Valentine?

From the Deacon

One of the things that Senior Ministry does that almost no one else knows about is the Home Touch letter. This is a four-page letter (two sheets) that goes out to some of our senior members who are 90 and over, or homebound, or have moved away from the Conejo Valley and want to stay in touch with New Hope.

Two pages we get from a subscription service called Home Touch that gives us a new devotions page and a new puzzle page every week. It costs less than a dollar a week for as many copies as we choose to make for this part, and the folks who get the letter each week like it. For the past three years we've added a personalized two-page letter as well. There's a rotating spot that Pastor Craig and I write, and once a month folks get the community announcements that are part of that week's Sunday worship bulletin. The fourth week is news from our youth group, or a focus on a ministry of the church. The second page from New Hope is a list of prayers from the Sunday service, and from our prayer chain. Many of the people who get Home Touch don't do email, and that's the way our prayer chain goes out to those who pray.

One of the most expensive parts of Home Touch isn't the subscription, or my time and the time of someone in the office who puts all of this together, or the supplies and copying; it's the postage. It costs 55 cents each week for each letter that goes out. Currently one person's postage for a year is almost \$30. One of the easiest ways to help fund Home Touch would be to drop off a packet of 100 stamps at the office. We go through almost 100 a month, so they're greatly appreciated.

Another way to help with Senior Ministry would be to plan to call and visit someone on the Home Touch list who's still in the Conejo Valley but isn't able to make it to church any more. I'm always happy to share a name with someone who's willing to commit to regular contact with someone who might be lonely.

From the Treasurer

Thank you for your outstanding generosity in 2019! Your giving amounted to \$428,071 and our expenditures were \$417,873. There was no fund transfer needed, and Council added over \$10,000 to the carryover fund to aid in finances for the next two years. The 2020 Budget, as approved by Council, was approved by the congregation at the congregational meeting on January 26th. Key items included the establishment of a longterm repair budget and a reduced mortgage payment due to the scheduled 10 year reset. Contact Joe Bulock if you have any questions.

CROP Walk – Sunday, March 1st at Cal Lutheran University

Walkers, workers and money are needed for the CROP Walk planned for Sunday, March 1st on the campus of Cal Lutheran. Registration and check in starts at 12 noon, and the walk starts at 1 PM. Your choices are a short walk, a longer walk, a short campus stroll or assisting with registration or water stations (we need to know about this choice in advance).

CROP Walks take place each year (for the last 50 years) around the country to address hunger and poverty locally and around the world. For example, farmers in Vietnam learn to build low cost water purification systems to access clean water. Two shelters in Belgrade, Serbia allows children to do homework, eat a meal, take a shower, and get a change of clothes. Farmers in the Dominican Republic improve their harvests and plant vegetable gardens. They also raise pigs, fish, and other animals to improve their diet and earn extra income.

Locally, the Conejo Valley CROP Walk provides supplemental funding to Meals on Wheels (both Westlake Village and Thousand Oaks), MANNA, the Conejo Valley Winter Shelter, the Conejo Valley Meals Program, and the Harvest Food Pantry.
