"Now in that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. (Luke 2:8-12)

For me, there is something comforting and nostalgic about this time of year. It makes me want to wrap myself in a warm blanket, drink some hot chocolate, and appreciate all the grandeur. I am looking forward to seeing who has the best Christmas lights in my neighborhood this year!

All of these Christmas celebrations are wonderful. They can connect us to each other and bring back good memories. At the same time, we should also remember that the first Christmas was very different. Mary and Joseph struggled to find a place to stay. There were no decorations or hot chocolate. Only a few people showed up to celebrate that first night: a group of shepherds. And then Jesus was placed in a manger, which is a trough meant for animal feed.

It was truly a humble night, and it was not what most people expected for the birth of a savior. But this is how God chose to enter the world. Why? Because the Lord wants to meet us where we are. In the moments when we feel low, like Mary and Joseph struggling to find a place to stay, we know that God is with us.

Christ was born in the messiness of our world, wrapped in simple bands of cloth. That shows us something powerful about Jesus: he wants to be as close to us as possible. Jesus is with you on the good days, the bad days, and even just the normal days. A God who was born in a manger can (and will!) show up anywhere.

I wish you a Merry Christmas this year. I pray that it is filled with good memories and wonderful celebrations. And most of all, remember what God has done for you: Christ was born in a manger. Christ loves you.
